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The Final Purification or Purgatory

1030 All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven.

1031 The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned.⁶⁰⁴ The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The tradition of the Church, by reference to certain texts of Scripture, speaks of a cleansing fire:

As for certain lesser faults, we must believe that, before the Final Judgment, there is a purifying fire. He who is truth says that whoever utters blasphemy against the Holy Spirit will be pardoned neither in this age nor in the age to come. From this sentence we understand that certain offenses can be forgiven in this age, but certain others in the age to come. (*St. Gregory the Great*)

1032 This teaching is also based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: "Therefore Judas Maccabeus] made atonement for the dead that they might be delivered from their sin."⁶⁰⁷ From the beginning the Church has honoured the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God.⁶⁰⁸ The Church alsocommends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead:

Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them. *(St. John Chrysostom)*

Padre Pio: St. Pio (Padre Pio) was an Italian Capuchin Priest who died in 1968 and who bore the wounds of Christ on his body for fifty years. Here are some of his sayings: Padre Pio said of Heaven: *"Heaven is total joy, continuous joy. We will be constantly thanking God. It is useless to try to figure out exactly what heaven is like, because we can't understand it. But when the veil of this life is taken off, we will understand things in a different way."*

"... at night when I close my eyes the veil is lifted and I see paradise open up before me: and gladdened by this vision I sleep with a smile of sweet beatitude on my lips and a perfectly tranquil countenance ... "

"More souls of the dead from Purgatory than of the living climb this mountain to attend my Masses and seek my prayers."

"The souls in Purgatory pray for us, and their prayers are even more effective than ours, because they are accompanied by their suffering. So, let's pray for them, and let's pray them to pray for us."

"You will be surprised to find in Paradise souls you never expected to be there."

"Most of the saved pass through Purgatory before arriving at the fullness of beatitude."

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Mitchelstown remembers our fallen sons. Throughout the Christian world, November is traditionally associated with remembrance of the dead. We pray for members of our families and community, candles are lit, Masses and prayers said for the intentions of guiding all souls to their eternal rest in Heaven. Almost 100 years ago, on the 11th of November 1918 this took on special significance as the guns on the Western & Eastern Fronts of The Great War fell silent. Over the course of the war more than 230,000 Irish men would fight with bravery and distinction in all theatres of war, over 49,000 Irish men paid the ultimate sacrifice. Due to events at home such as the Easter Rising of 1916 and subsequent struggle for Independence their names faded into obscurity, families grieved privately and the survivors found themselves strangers in their homeland. Current research suggests that at least 350 sons of Mitchelstown enlisted here, in the Market House or Military Barracks, in Fermoy or even in far-away lands like Canada or New Zealand. Official records list thirty-nine names from Mitchelstown of men who died in The Great War. Unfortunately their generation and those that followed chose to forget about these brave, sad men. W.W.I. has been described as Act. 1 of World War Two, ten Mitchelstown men died in this conflict. Next year Mitchelstown Heritage Society plans to unveil a permanent memorial to these men, this Remembrance month, please say a prayer for our war dead.
